



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Appendix A-2: Findings By Event

This section summarizes the main themes that the Shafter General Plan team heard from individual events and the online survey.

Shafter Cinco de Mayo

May 3, 2025 (11:30am - 3:00pm)

The Shafter General Plan team had a pop-up booth to engage with Shafter community members who took part in the event festivities. The event attracts over 1,000 attendees, of whom approximately 143 people participated in the board exercises, but hundreds more saw the booth, interacted with staff, and were made aware of the General Plan Update. Those who participated were asked to share where they live. Most participants (60%) were Shafter residents, while 35% lived outside of the city. A small number of those living outside of Shafter (~5%) noted they lived in unincorporated communities near Shafter.

What We Heard:

- What is most important for creating a more connected community?
 More participants (57% 81 of 143 respondents) preferred improvements to local connections over regional connections. Examples of such improvements include pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure that create a safe, walkable, and bikeable city core.
- How many new homes and shops should Shafter plan for?
 Most people (69% 97 of 143 respondents) supported increased development, where they have more places to live and shop.
- How do we route trucks from industrial areas in Bakersfield and Shafter to SR 99?
 Participants (69% 99 of 140 respondents) preferred routing trucks away from the growth near
 Shafter's core to avoid impacts on future residential areas over having truck traffic along Cherry
 Avenue with design features to reduce impacts on future residential areas.
- What would most improve City processes so that resident input can affect the outcome of City decisions? (pick 2)

Of the seven types of community engagement methods that the City could improve on, having bilingual city staff (21% 51of 247 responses) and public meetings (17% of 247 responses) received the most votes.

- Over the Next 20 years, what other issues should the City plan for?
 Participants were invited to write their response on a sticky note. The Key takeaways from 72 responses are noted below. See original comments in Appendix B-1.
 - ⇒ <u>More diverse shopping and dining options.</u> Participants shared a desire for more diverse retail and commercial options, including grocery stores, larger retail (Target, Walmart, Costco), and restaurants. They expressed frustration with the prevalence of car washes and Starbucks.
 - ⇒ <u>Address housing needs.</u> The city needs more affordable housing and more types of housing (townhomes, apartments, etc. in addition to single-family homes to address rising rent and

provide housing choices for a wider range of incomes and needs for people who wish to stay in Shafter

- ⇒ Roadway improvements. Input on infrastructure and transportation highlighted the need to improve and maintain roads, address safety concerns with some identifying a desire for more traffic signals and stop signs, improve pedestrian and bike infrastructure, and expand public transit options.
- ⇒ <u>More parks and recreation opportunities</u>. Participants would like more parks and recreation facilities, including family fun spots (theaters, amusement centers), teen hangout areas, community pools, and gyms.
- ⇒ Improve access to jobs and education. Participants expressed a call for increased educational opportunities and jobs for youth, specifically suggesting the development of a local Community College/vocational Campus.

Shafter High School

May 7, 2025 (lunchtime)

Shafter High School students had an opportunity to share their input at a lunchtime pop-up booth held at the high school. For the 2024-2025 academic school year, Shafter High School enrolled 1,599 students. During their lunchtime break, approximately 73 students stopped by the booth to give input for the general plan.

What We Heard:

- What is most important for creating a more connected community?
 Similar to the feedback received from the Cinco de Mayo event, more students preferred improvements to local connections over regional connections.
- How many new homes and shops should Shafter plan for?
 Students overwhelmingly supported more places to live and shop.
- How do we route trucks from industrial areas in Bakersfield and Shafter to SR 99?
 Students also overwhelmingly preferred routing trucks away from the growth near Shafter's core to avoid impacts on future residential areas over having truck traffic along Cherry Avenue with design features to reduce impacts on future residential areas.
- What would most improve City processes so that resident input can affect the outcome of City decisions?
 - Participants shared that having bilingual city staff and access to materials were two of their preferred ways that the City could improve, so that resident input can affect the outcome of City decisions.
- Over the Next 20 years, what other issues should the City plan for?

 Participants were invited to write their response on a sticky note. The Key takeaways from the 32 responses are noted below. See the original comments in Appendix B-2.

- ⇒ <u>More shopping, dining, entertainment, and entertainment options</u>. Participants expressed interest in more food, retail, and entertainment options (with emphasis on popular chains and entertainment venues).
- ⇒ Extended hours for Dial-A-Ride services and improved transportation options. A small handful of participants commented on the need to extend Dial-A-Ride services and other transportation services.
- ⇒ More urgent care and other medical facilities. A few people commented on the desire for more healthcare facilities, such as an urgent care and hospital.

Input collected at the Shafter Highschool event is included in Appendix B-2.

First Fridays | June 5, 2025 (6:00 pm to 9:00 pm): The GP team held a pop-up event at the June First Fridays evening event. Team members received input from approximately 46 community members for the general plan, but spoke with dozens more, raising awareness about the general plan update process.

What We Heard:

- What is most important for creating a more connected community?
 - Similar to the feedback received from the Cinco de Mayo event and outreach at Shafter High School, most participants expressed support for improvements to local connections over regional connections.
- How many new homes and shops should Shafter plan for?
 Participants supported an increase in commercial and residential development to
 - Participants supported an increase in commercial and residential development to have more places to live and shop.
- How do we route trucks from industrial areas in Bakersfield and Shafter to SR 99?
 Unlike the participants at the Cinco de Mayo event and students, the majority of participants shared that they preferred having truck traffic along Cherry Avenue with design features to reduce impacts on future residential areas over routing trucks away from the growth near Shafter's core to avoid impacts on future residential areas.
- What would most improve City processes so that resident input can affect the outcome of City decisions?
 - Participants overwhelmingly preferred having notifications as their preferred way that the City could improve, so that resident input can affect the outcome of City decisions.
- Over the Next 20 years, what other issues should the City plan for?

 Participants were invited to write their response on a sticky note. The Key takeaways from the 32 responses are noted below. See the original comments in Appendix B-2.
 - ⇒ <u>More shopping, dining, entertainment, and entertainment options.</u> They commented on the need for more variety of commercial, shopping, and dining establishments, such as more markets and shopping centers, restaurants, and entertainment and recreation facilities.
 - ⇒ Improvements to infrastructure and connectivity. Some participants showed support for connecting existing roads, like a "Zachary & Driver Road connection to Lerdo Highway", as well as improving bike lane accessibility.

- ⇒ <u>More affordable housing options</u>. Several participants expressed support for more residential development, particularly affordable apartments.
- ⇒ <u>Healthcare and Services</u>. Requests for daycare facilities, PopMart shopping options, and improved access to essential services

Online Survey

May 23, 2025 to July 21, 2025.

An online survey was available for community members that didn't have the opportunity to share input through the in-person workshop series. The online survey received 173 responses.

Complete Online Survey results are included in Appendix C.

Who Responded:

Most respondents (90%) were Shafter residents, and 2/3 were property owners. Most respondents were between the ages of 30 to 49 years old (60%), with the second largest group age 50 and older (25%).

What We Heard:

Multiple Choice Questions

What is most important for creating a more connected community?

The community strongly favored local improvements over regional connections.

- 74.57% (129 respondents) chose <u>Local Connections improving pedestrian and bike</u> infrastructure for a safe, walkable, and bikeable city core
- 25.43% (44 respondents) chose Regional Trail connecting Shafter's core to Gossamer Grove and the Kern River through a regional trail

Additional comments revealed several key themes (38 comments):

- ⇒ <u>Pedestrian Safety Priorities</u> Multiple requests for safer crosswalks, especially near schools, speed radars, and warning lights at dangerous intersections like Highway 43 and Tulare
- ⇒ Road Infrastructure First Several comments emphasized fixing existing roads, repaving, and improving lighting should take priority over bike lanes or trails
- ⇒ <u>Security and Practical Concerns</u> Some residents viewed a regional trail to Gossamer Grove as a "security nightmare" and questioned whether people would actually use it for long-distance travel
- ⇒ <u>Downtown Focus Over Regional Connections</u> Strong preference for improving "old Shafter" and the actual downtown core rather than connecting to newer developments
- ⇒ <u>Transportation for Vulnerable Populations</u> Requests for better transportation options for seniors and people without vehicles, including seven-day-a-week service
- ⇒ Opposition to Expansion Through Farmland Concerns that cutting through agricultural land would harm neighbors and damage the local economy

- ⇒ <u>Cost Concerns</u> Multiple requests to implement improvements without increasing fees, especially for low-income residents
- ⇒ <u>Mixed Support for Both Options</u> Some residents expressed wanting elements of both local connections and regional trails rather than having to choose one
- ⇒ <u>Skepticism About Growth Benefits</u> Several comments questioned whether increasing population by 40% or "selling out to corporations" would benefit the community

How many new homes and shops should Shafter plan for?

The community was nearly split, with a slight majority preferring limited growth.

- 54.34% (94 respondents) favored <u>Limited Housing and Retail Expansion</u>
- 45.66% (79 respondents) favored More Places to Live, More Places to Shop

Additional comments revealed several key themes (45 comments):

- ⇒ <u>Small Town Preservation</u> Residents repeatedly emphasized wanting to maintain Shafter's small town character and avoid becoming like larger cities such as Bakersfield
- ⇒ <u>Water Infrastructure Concerns</u> Multiple comments questioned the logic of building more housing when the city already has water usage restrictions for current residents
- ⇒ <u>Downtown Investment Priority</u> Strong preference for improving and revitalizing existing downtown areas and supporting current local businesses before expanding outward
- ⇒ Opposition to Specific Development Significant resistance to the "Wonderful" development project, with residents viewing it as a corporate takeover of their community
- ⇒ <u>Housing Type Preferences</u> Mixed views on housing needs, with some supporting affordable housing for all income levels, while others oppose low-income developments near established neighborhoods
- ⇒ Retail and Service Gaps Desire for better grocery stores, more diverse dining options, and improved shopping variety while maintaining preference for local over chain businesses
- ⇒ <u>Traffic and Infrastructure Planning</u> Concerns about increased traffic congestion and demands that infrastructure improvements precede any new development approvals

How do we route trucks from industrial areas in Bakersfield and Shafter to SR 99?

The majority of respondents preferred keeping truck traffic away from the city core.

- 63.58% (110 respondents) chose <u>Future Truck Route South of Lerdo Highway routing truck</u> traffic away from future growth near Shafter's core
- 36.42% (63 respondents) chose Future Truck Route Along Cherry Avenue with design features to reduce impacts on future residential uses

Additional comments revealed several key themes (15 comments):

- ⇒ <u>7th Standard Road Preference</u> Multiple comments suggested using 7th Standard Road as the primary truck route since it already connects Highway 99 and Interstate 5, keeping heavy traffic away from residential areas
- ⇒ <u>Current Safety Issues</u> Residents noted dangerous conditions at existing intersections, particularly where heavy-duty trucks merge from Cherry onto Lerdo Highway without complete stops, creating safety hazards

- ⇒ <u>Infrastructure Planning Criticism</u> Criticism that the Wonderful Industrial Park was approved without proper truck traffic planning, creating current problems that should serve as a lesson for future development
- ⇒ <u>Traffic Signal Needs</u> Several requests for traffic lights or 4-way stops at Cherry Avenue if it becomes a truck route to ensure safe access
- ⇒ <u>Concerns About Both Options</u> Some residents felt both proposed routes would worsen traffic on Central Valley Highway, which already experiences heavy congestion during morning and evening hours
- ⇒ <u>Developer Responsibility</u> Comments emphasizing that any projects increasing truck traffic should require developers to fund road improvements (widening, merge lanes, overpasses) before construction begins
- ⇒ <u>High-Speed Rail Impact</u> Concerns about how future high-speed rail construction might affect existing railroad crossings and force more reliance on Cherry Avenue
- ⇒ <u>Geographic Confusion</u> At least one respondent noted confusion about the difference between the two route options

What would most improve City processes so that resident input can affect the outcome of City decisions?

Survey Results:

- ⇒ 44.51% (77 respondents) chose <u>Public Meetings</u> more meetings throughout all decisionmaking stages
- ⇒ 39.88% (69 respondents) chose <u>Surveys</u> more online or paper surveys
- ⇒ 36.42% (63 respondents) chose Online Engagement more social media and informational websites
- ⇒ 34.68% (60 respondents) chose Access to Materials materials provided earlier in the process
- \Rightarrow 33.53% (58 respondents) chose Notifications more/earlier notifications of major projects
- ⇒ 4.62% (8 respondents) chose Bilingual Staff
- ⇒ 3.47% (6 respondents) chose Language translate materials and provide interpretation
- ⇒ 2.89% (5 respondents) chose Other

Additional comments revealed several key themes (20 comments):

Key Themes from Comments:

- ⇒ <u>Skepticism About Genuine Input</u> Multiple residents expressed doubt that public input influences decisions, feeling that city council has already made up their minds before seeking community feedback
- ⇒ <u>Preference for Traditional Communication</u> Several comments emphasized not everyone uses social media and requested paper surveys at city hall and other physical locations for broader community access
- ⇒ <u>Older Population Outreach</u> Concerns that online-focused engagement misses older residents who may have valuable input but lack digital access
- ⇒ <u>Meeting Sponsorship Concerns</u> Criticism that public meetings should be hosted by the city and elected officials, not by companies like "Wonderful" with their own agendas

- ⇒ <u>Survey Quality Issues</u> One resident specifically criticized current city surveys as "loaded with bias" and suggested hiring statisticians to improve data collection
- ⇒ <u>Transparency Demands</u> Calls for the city to be more transparent and honest with citizens about projects and decision-making processes
- ⇒ <u>Timing and Accessibility</u> Requests for surveys and materials to be available with plenty of advance time and through multiple channels
- ⇒ Opposition to Bilingual Services At least one comment opposed spending taxpayer money on additional bilingual services
- ⇒ <u>Dedicated Information Hub</u> Suggestion for a dedicated webpage with community events, city news, and project updates for residents who don't use social media

Over the Next 20 years, what other issues should the City plan for?

The Key takeaways from the 12 responses are noted below. See the original comments in Appendix C (Question 12).

- ⇒ <u>Preserve Shafter's small-town identity and manage growth.</u> Many respondents shared the sentiment to keep Shafter small.
- ⇒ <u>Improve existing infrastructure and public safety:</u> Many people expressed support to have roads and lighting as a top priority for new additions and improvements. Pedestrian and vehicle safety were also priority concerns.
- ⇒ Revitalize and focus on "Old" and Downtown Shafter: Multiple respondents commented on the desire for rebuilding and improving the historic downtown, including highlighting and supporting local small businesses along Main Street. There was a focus on the "Old" Shafter and supporting local businesses and agricultural businesses as essential for community identity.
- ⇒ Enhance community engagement and transparency. Several respondents commented on the need for more town meetings and for local government to receive and implement community input from Shafter residents.
- ⇒ <u>More community open space and recreation opportunities.</u> Multiple people noted the desire for more community amenities, such as parks, a dog park, and improving recreational programs.








